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What is Cystoscopy?

A cystoscopy is an internal examination where a telescope is passed along the water pipe or urethra to inspect the inside of the bladder.

This may be done with either a short general anesthetic or with local anesthetic.

Before your operation

Please bath or shower on the morning of your appointment.

After your operation

Passing urine after the examination will be 'nippy' for a time. Some blood may be passed in urine for a few days after the examination.

It is important that you drink at least 2-3 liters of fluid a day for three days after the examination. This will reduce discomfort and help clear any bleeding.

Mild painkillers will help reduce any discomfort.
