The Royal College of Physicians of Edinburg (RCPE) is organizing Gastroenterology symposium on 18th November 2016. There is no fee for attendance at SKMCH&RC venue but pre-registration is required especially for outside participants.

The Gastroenterology Symposium in 2016 centres around the role of environmental factors in the pathogenesis and treatment of gastrointestinal and liver disease. Diet in the Western world plays a key role in many facets of health and disease in the early parts of the 21st century. In addition to the obvious adverse effects on obesity, metabolic syndrome and cancer, it is increasingly evident that diet not only alters homeostasis in the gut and the liver but also contributes to many different disease phenotypes.

The inflammatory bowel diseases, for example, are likely caused by effects of diet and other environmental factors on the gut microbiota and hence the mucosal immune system in genetically susceptible individuals. Therapeutic approaches in manipulating diet have been the mainstay of inducing remission in paediatric Crohn's disease; more specific dietary approaches to maintaining remission are being explored in adult IBD.

Low FODMAP diets in irritable bowel syndrome now have an extensive evidence base and are being adopted with great success in the clinic. The pandemic of chronic liver disease is now being driven not only by alcohol but also increasingly by non-alcoholic fatty liver disease. An expert faculty has been assembled to address these issues.

Our keynote lecturer Professor Ran from Shanghai will look at the lessons we can learn in the West from the inexorable rise of Crohn's disease and ulcerative colitis in the East. This symposium will be informative and practical with immediate impact on clinical practice. It is open to all medical professionals from gastroenterologists, surgeons, GPs, trainees, nursing staff and other members of the multi-disciplinary team. We look forward to welcoming you to Edinburgh for a day of fascinating learning and discussion.
